Dear Mr Day

Thank you for your letter of 26 April in which the Devonport Fly Fishing Club reiterates the concerns raised by Mr Todd Lambert regarding Arthurs Lake, and the need for a legislated drawdown level, and the resolution of water rights of riparian landowners on the Lake River.

As I set out in my letter to Mr Lambert, the Government recognises that Arthurs Lake has developed into a highly valued, multipurpose water resource. Whilst the Lake was first modified and is used primarily to supply water for hydro-electric generation, it is also used at times to supply irrigation water to riparian landowners on the Lake River, and domestic water supplies for local settlements. Arthurs Lake also has significant environmental values, and is one of the premier recreational fishing areas in the State.

In regard to electricity generation, Hydro Tasmania pumps water from Arthurs Lake into Great Lake. I understand that typically the pumps are run continuously except when being modified or repaired, and historically this has averaged about nine months running each year. As well as pumping, water is released through a riparian valve and at times through siphons to allow water to flow to Woods Lake. During drought conditions, water from Arthurs Lake has been used to supply water to riparian landowners on the Lake River, though generally the water available from Woods Lake, Poatina and the Lake River Pipeline is sufficient to meet these needs.

Hydro Tasmania manages the water level of Arthurs Lake in accordance with a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with the Inland Fisheries Service. I am advised that under the MoU, Hydro Tasmania aims to achieve a minimum water level of 948.0 m above sea level (ASL) on 1 June each year and a minimum level of 949.0 m ASL on 1 November each year. With the proposed Midlands Water Scheme, the MoU provides agreed minimum water levels 1 m higher when the Scheme is active (949.0 m ASL and 950.0 m ASL on 1 June and 1 November of each year respectively).

Whilst the MoU is not legally binding, Hydro Tasmania, in recognition of the recreational values of the Lake, uses its best endeavours to meet the MoU provisions. However, during times of low system storage or when the water level in Great Lake is low (as was the case under prolonged drought conditions two years ago), the water level of Arthurs Lake may be drawn below the agreed level. In these circumstances, the MoU requires Hydro Tasmania to notify the Director of Inland Fisheries.

In addition to the MoU, Hydro Tasmania operates Arthurs Lake in accordance with a set of storage operation rules. To guide operation of Arthurs Lake, risk bands have been determined based upon potential impacts of declining water levels on the endangered galaxiid fish species *Galaxias tanycephalus* and *Paragalaxias mesotes*, as well as on water quality.

It must be emphasised that the continuity of electricity supply is a key consideration in water level management. I am advised that normally, the Arthurs Lake pumps are operated whenever the water level is above the agreed level. The absolute minimum operable water level of Arthurs Lake however is 943.05 m ASL, and in theory, the lake could be drawn down to this level if necessary to maintain electricity generation. Clearly, this is a worst case scenario and highly unlikely, given that the State is now not solely reliant on domestically generated electricity.

In regard to the Midlands Water Scheme and Hydro Tasmania's management of lake water levels, and in addition to the MoJ, there is a physical limit that prevents water being taken when the lake water level is below 947.5 m ASL. This physical limit is due to the agreed configuration of the offtake infrastructure for the Scheme, which provides access to water only when the level of the lake is above 947.5 m ASL.

Farmers purchasing irrigation rights in the Scheme are aware of the reliability of supply, and the supply constraints. Notwithstanding the constraint on access, assessments have indicated that the reliability of the water supply for Midlands Water Scheme is high.

I note that your letter suggests a legislated minimum draw down level for Arthurs Lake is required. I do not support this approach as, first and foremost, it is essential that Hydro Tasmania retains flexibility in managing lake water levels to ensure the State's electricity generation security, and secondly, because there are robust arrangements in place to manage the water level of Arthurs Lake to meet recreational and environmental values.

A legislated minimum draw down level is also not required in regard to the Midlands Water Scheme. In the event of prolonged drought, and should the water level of Arthurs Lake drop to 947.5 m ASL, there will be no further access available to the Scheme. The offtake infrastructure, together with the terms of the water supply agreement between Hydro Tasmania and the Tasmanian Irrigation Development Board, will prevent this.

I turn now to the statutory water rights of riparian landowners on the Lake River. I must emphasise that the current legislation obliges Hydro Tasmania to make water available to relevant landowners, in effect without condition. This statutory requirement goes back over 50 years, and the Government has no intention of placing new conditions on this requirement.

We will however, very shortly, introduce legislation that will provide for the amount of water to be made available to be determined volumetrically, either through a negotiated outcome between Hydro Tasmania and the relevant landowners, or through an independent and transparent arbitration process. In either case, I expect that the outcome will be based upon a realistic assessment of irrigation needs, taking into account land capability, cropping types and irrigation application methods.

Whilst I do not wish to pre-empt the outcome of this process, I would expect that the volume of water made available to relevant landowners will provide for some growth in irrigation. I do not believe that the outcome will dramatically increase the volume of water sourced from Arthurs Lake to meet Hydro Tasmania's obligations.

I trust that I have allayed your concerns with regard to Arthurs Lake.

Fly tying weekend at the Lodge starting 30/07/11 at 10.00 am



BRIAN McCULLAGH

Brian McCullagh is a guide at London Lakes in Tasmania and has recently established the 'Noel and Vince' fly tying and fishing school. He has been fishing in Tasmania for some 40 years and in recent times has fished in the South Island of New Zealand.

A member of the Fly Tiers Club of Tasmania, Brian won the first Tasmanian Fly Fishing Occasional Ship in 1994.

After leaving school and starting work with the E.Z. Company in Hobart, Brian met and worked with the late Kevin Wessinger who introduced him to fly fishing.

In 1967 Brian joined the Hydro Electric Commission as a power station shift engineer and he lived at Tarruleah and later Strathgordon—an ideal excuse to pursue his passion for fly fishing. Fishing Lake Pedder in the late '70s was a highlight—in exactly every spare moment of 20-200 fly.

After 30 years with the HEC a car accident ended his career. During an extended period of convalescence, long-time friend and fly-tyer Tony Dell encouraged Brian to improve his fly tying skills, and most days were spent tying flies and reading books on fly fishing.

In retirement Brian now pursues his fly tying love, teaches fly tying, and enjoys fishing when not working as a guide at London Lakes.

My first contact with the Devil Leech pattern was while guiding at London Lakes, Tasmania, in the Christmas week of 1995. Doug Swisher (well known fishing writer, fly-tyer and fly fishing instructor) from America was staying at the Lodge on his way to New Zealand to give seminars on fly fishing. On his first day while being guided by Jason Carrett, Doug caught ten fish in Lake Samuel and most were caught on the Devil Leech pattern.

On the second day, I guided Doug for the early morning session. A cold south-westerly wind was blowing across Lake Big Jim and I knew that the sight fishing of recent days was going to be non-existent. Doug was also quick to realise this and asked for my two best wet fly patterns for the lake and the conditions. I had no hesitation in giving him a brown Woolly Wurm and my green and orange Rabbit Ear Fly.

Doug told me that both flies were only reserves and that he would like to try his Devil Leech pattern. My other client that morning was an experienced regular at London Lakes. In the next three hours Doug searched the weeds alternating catching and releasing nine fish and rising as many as he caught. I continued to change flies and tactics with my other client at a frantic rate with our score for the morning 'nil'—not even a chance. As we walked back to the vehicle Doug gave my other client a Leech pattern so my later in the day. After breakfast Doug departed for New Zealand and the Devil Leech pattern produced four fish and some near misses for my remaining client. I took no more convincing that this fly was an exceptional fish-catching pattern.

From America, Doug later sent me some Tasmanian Devil Hair (is synthetic—not the real thing) and tying instructions. I now tie this pattern in brown, green and black, and for the short time that I have been able to fish this fly it has had some outstanding results at Lake Sorrell, Errote Lagoon and Great Lake.

Doug Swisher now regards the Devil Leech as his favourite trout streamer, even surpassing the mighty Woolly Bugger.

Besides the tactful action of the Tasmanian Devil Hair, the Devil Leech has the advantage of being tangle proof if correctly tied. The tail fouling problems experienced with similar patterns are non-existent. The key lies in tying in the tail so that each

clump is slightly shorter than the one above it, thus protecting it from tangling or cocking. A final trim with the scissors is often required to get the taper just right.

The Devil Leech pattern is a difficult fly to cast due to the wind resistance of the hair. Before commencing to fish, place it in water and squeeze firmly to remove the air that is captured in the synthetic body material. Due to the buoyancy of the Devil Hair, the fly will float on the surface and a couple of quick jerks may be needed to submerge it. It is best retrieved in an erratic motion. Fish take it very aggressively and it is often snatched from the surface even before you've had a chance to begin the retrieve. Keep false casts to a minimum when fishing this pattern.

The tying procedure involves building the tail in sections, each slightly longer than the previous one. After adding the third clump of hair to form the tail, tie in two strands of Crystal Hair on each side. Then tie in the final clump of hair to complete the tail. To build the body tie the Mohlon yarn in from the eye of the hook back to the formed tail. Tie in a length of hair to form a U shaped crest. Fold back the hair over the tail and add two turns of Mohlon to progress the body. Add the next length of hair in the same way and continue the process to the eye of the hook. Then tie in two more strands of Crystal Hair on each side. Tie off and roughen the body with Velcro to make it as shaggy as possible. Trim tail if necessary to ensure each fibre is slightly shorter than the one above it.

The information above is a copy of the chapter on Brian from "Australia's Best Trout Flies". Unfortunately, it was published in 1997, so it is a bit out of date. As you can see, Brian was a guide at London Lakes alongside Trevor Berne. He is no longer retired (along with his wife, he runs a camper van hire franchise in Hobart) and has been active until recently in the national and international fly fishing events, having served a period of time as Secretary of the Tasmanian branch of Fly Fish Australia Inc.

On the Saturday, he will run through a few of his fly patterns (including the devil leech). He is about to order some more tying material for the devil leech for his own use from the US but will increase the size of the order and will have some of the material (synthetic Tassie Devil Fur – actually very similar to dyed lambs' wool and definitely not anything to do with a real Tasmanian Devil) available for sale to our members on the day.

On the Sunday morning, he will also hold a session on dyeing fur and feathers, in particular preparation of materials for dyeing.

Barry will look after the catering/cooking side of things (lunch and morning/afternoon tea both days and breakfast on Sunday for \$5 per day). As usual, we will go to the Central Highlands Lodge for dinner on the Saturday night. We have a cut of number of 16 people, preferably advanced tiers only. Further contacts David Best (64246628).

Open day fishing will be at the club dam (Peters) at 8.30 am until around 11ish am and then we will move on to a second location. More fishing details can be obtained from the next meeting. This year we will need to bring our own lunch and drinks.
